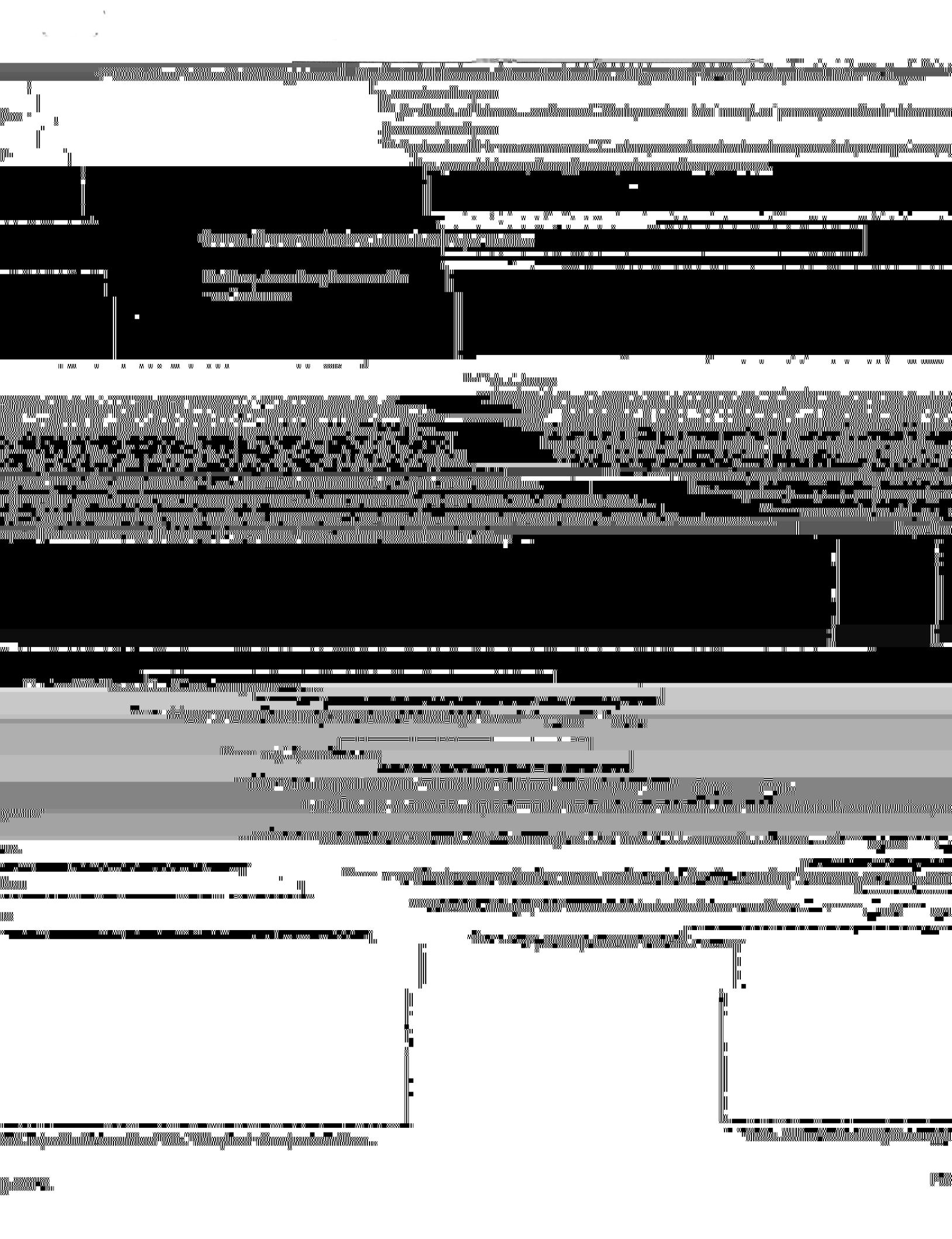

Course Description: This course covers the political, social, and cultural history of Japan to 1600 CE, including prehistory, the Neolithic, the development of the early Japanese state, the classical period, and the medieval period.

Course Goals:

1. Students will demonstrate understanding of the political, social, and cultural history of premodern Japan.

2. Students will demonstrate an ability to read and interpret primary sources in the history of premodern Japan.

3. Students will demonstrate an ability to research and write about a topic in premodern

Japanese history using primary and secondary sources.
