While the Network of Schools of Public Policy, Affairs, and Administration (NASPAA) offers voluntary accreditation for professional master's programs in the listed subfields of political science, there is no recognized accreditation for undergraduate programs in political science. As a result, the political science program is only accredited as part of MGA's general accreditation to confer undergraduate degrees as a Level 5 (Doctoral granting) institution by SACS COC.

We believe that we can counter these trends by pursuing an untapped opportunity for program growth: delivering the full program to students in a fully online format. As of fall 2021, the majority of students enrolled in the political science program were already taking most or all of their classes in a fully online format even though at present it is impossible to complete all of the degree requirements online (at least without the use of transfer/transient credit from other institutions). While many USG institutions offer a political science degree, only a few currently offer it in a fully online format. Online delivery would also allow for the department to make greater use of qualified part-time faculty and allow full-time faculty on all campuses to contribute more effectively to the degree program. Accordingly, our plan is to phase in a fully online delivery option for students over the next two academic years, while retaining the existing option to complete the degree program using (mostly) face-to-face classes on the Macon campus. We believe this would be an effective strategy to build on the existing program's strengths while also fulfilling the institutional mission to provide an affordable, high-quality education for students in the region and beyond.
